
FOCUS truly sets out to inspire and equip Catholic college students for a lifetime of Christ-centered evangelization, discipleship, and friendship. FOCUS has over 550 student-trained missionaries on 125 college campuses. Here in Pennsylvania, FOCUS missionaries serve campus ministry programs at three college campuses: Carnegie Mellon University, Temple University, and the University of Pittsburgh. And soon, FOCUS missionaries will be at a 4th Pennsylvania site, the Catholic Campus Ministry program at Slippery Rock University. The application has been processed and has received the blessing of the Bishop. If everything goes as planned, two FOCUS missionaries will become a part of our ministry team in the Fall.

A Reflection on Lent and Easter

About six years ago or so, I started my own Good Friday evening tradition of watching Mel Gibson's movie, "The Passion of the Christ." The purpose of watching this movie was to help me focus more fully on the sufferings Jesus experienced for me. One aspect of His sufferings that stood out for me was Christ's loss of blood. Jesus began His journey to the cross with



perspiring drops of blood in His agony in the Garden. Through each moment of His horrific scourging at the pillar, the crowning of thorns, carrying the heavy cross, being nailed to the cross and breathing His final breath, Jesus' blood was oozing out of Him. We see with the thrust of the guard's lance into Jesus' side, blood and water flowed out, which indicated that Jesus actually lost all of His blood along the journey. How was it possible for Jesus to continue that agonizing journey as His blood was dripping out of Him?

Three years ago, while I was team building with a group of retreat leaders, I slipped on the ice and crushed my wrist. The doctor had to insert 4 plates and 8 screws in my left wrist to assist in the healing process. During one of the homilies I gave at Mass, I shared that when I fell, I lost consciousness for a short period of time and the EMTs were called and took me to the hospital. I didn't and still don't recall hitting the ground. After Mass, a medical personnel came up to me and shared that the body goes into a natural preservation mode by shutting down – losing consciousness – when a person is in great pain.

Let us take this season of Lent to help us embrace the sufferings of Christ and through His love, live in the Spirit of the Resurrected Christ.

LPSCU EDUCATIONAL BENEFIT 2017 COLLEGE AWARD

\$500 One-Time Award

The LPSCU is offering a \$500, one-time College Award to our members who will be attending college during the 2017-2018 academic year. A total of 25 College Awards will be granted.

These are the guidelines for those applying for this award:

- Applicants must be a member of the LPSCU for two (2) years with at least a \$2,000 permanent reserve life insurance plan (excludes term insurance).
- Applicants must be a high school senior or college freshman, sophomore, or junior.
- High school seniors must provide a letter of recommendation from a school representative (ex: teacher, guidance counselor, or principal).
- High school applicants must submit an official transcript from their school that includes test scores; College students must submit documentation indicating latest overall GPA.
- Applicants must provide a detailed list of extracurricular activities, honors, and awards.
- Applicants must provide a detailed list of church, community, volunteer, and work activities including honors and awards, with reference(s) included.
- Applicants must be attending an accredited college/university on a full time basis for the 2017-2018 academic year and must submit proof of acceptance for the Fall 2017 semester.
- Applicants must submit a brief essay (no more than 200 words) on the topic "Why is life insurance important?"
- Applicants must provide a wallet-size color photo.

SCALLOPS AND SHRIMP AU GRATIN

2 Tbsp. butter	1/
¼ cup flour	1
1 cup milk	1/
1½ lbs. scallops	1
¼ lb. shrimp	2
1 can sliced mushrooms	Р

1⁄4 cup chopped onion 1 tsp. grated lemon peel 1/8 tsp. garlic powder 1 cup shredded cheese 2 Tbsp. bread crumbs Paprika

In a skillet, melt butter. Blend in flour. Cook over medium heat until smooth. Remove from heat. Stir in milk. Heat to boiling, stirring constantly. Boil one minute. Add scallops and shrimp, mushrooms with liquid,

onion, lemon peel, and garlic powder. Turn into 1 quart buttered casserole. Combine cheese and crumbs and sprinkle on top. Garnish with paprika. Bake at 325 degrees for 20 minutes or until bubbly.



<u>In Memoriam</u>

Sister M. Rosamund Dupak, SS.C.M.

Sister M. Rosamund, SS.C.M., born Helen C. Dupak, died at Emmanuel Center, Danville, Pennsylvania, on Saturday, January 14, 2017. Born on September 25, 1920, in Exeter, Pennsylvania, she was one of nine children of the late Joseph and Johanna (Fedorko) Dupak. She attended St. John the Baptist School, Pittston, Pennsylvania, and graduated from St. Cyril Academy in Danville. Sister received her B.A. from Marywood University, Scranton,

Pennsylvania, and her M.A. in Drama from Villanova University, Villanova, Pennsylvania. On February 11, 1939, she entered the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius in Danville and was received as a novice on October 17, 1939. On that same day, Dennis Cardinal Dougherty of Philadelphia dedicated the newlyerected chapel (now the Basilica) of Saints Cyril and Methodius. Sister Rosamund was professed on August 18, 1941.

Over the course of her Religious life, Sister Rosamund was involved in the ministry of education in parish schools in Connecticut, Pennsylvania, and Indiana. She was superior and principal at St. Columba School in Bloomsburg, Pennsylvania, from 1971 to 1979. In 1980 she was elected to the Leadership Team of the Sisters of Saints Cyril and Methodius and served as assistant to the General Superior until 1984. That year she returned to St. Columba's where she taught fourth grade until 1988. Her next mission was to Holy Ghost Parish in Olyphant, Pennsylvania, where she visited the elderly parishioners and helped organize a Golden Age Club which benefited the elderly both educationally and spiritually. From 1991-1994, she helped direct the Religious Education program at Sacred Heart Church in Peckville, Pennsylvania, and was also involved with the RCIA program there. Sister Rosamund also taught on the secondary level at St. Cyril Academy from 1948-67 and at Andrean High School, Merrillville, Indiana, from 1967-70, where she taught French. She served as Administrator at Maria Hall, Danville, from 1994-98.

Sister Rosamund retired to Maria Hall in 2012, and was involved in the ministry of prayer and hospitality. She later became a resident of Emmanuel Center.

Sister Rosamumd is survived by a sister, Mrs. Margaret Byrn at Emmanuel Center, Danville; a nephew, Thomas Luciano of Alameda, California; and nieces, Susan DiPaola of New Providence, New Jersey, Marion Chapman of Bethlehem, Pennsylvania, and Joanne Chintala of Lauderhill, Florida.

On Friday, January 20, 2017, the transferal rite and recitation of the Rosary took place at Maria Hall, Danville, followed by a Wake Service. A Mass of Christian Burial was celebrated by the Reverend Gerard Heintzelman at Maria Hall. Burial followed in the Sisters' cemetery.

- Attend (or will attend) an accredited college/university as a full time student.
- Provide a notice of acceptance or tuition receipt for the coming scholastic year.
- Provide a wallet-size color photo.

Bojnice Castle

Rising high above the town of the same name in Slovakia, Bojnice (BOY-nee-tse) castle was originally built in the 12th century. The castle underwent its greatest renovation at the end of the 19th century, when it was owned by Jan Palffy. Today Bojnice castle, with its fairy-tale beauty, is one of the most visited and its romantic exterior leads it to being used by foreign filmmakers. In fact, several films have been shot at the castle, and some even claim that the castle at California's Disneyland was modeled after it.

An interesting legend surrounds Bojnice castle. Long ago, the castle warden, Peter Poky, had an evil nature and was a well-known miser. He chased all the poor people away from the curative



springs at the Bojnice spa and he collected extremely high fees from those who could pay to go there. Once, he allegedly entered the spa and found a poor old man bathing there, easing his painful joints in the hot water. The warden shouted at him and ordered him to pay up or to leave immediately. The old man begged for leniency, but the warden chased him out.

Shamed, the old man said before leaving: "Warden, you are cruel and greedy. I curse you and wish that all the ducats you have hidden in trunks in the castle be turned to stone just like your heart." The warden was frightened and ran back to the castle to see if his money was safe. But the old man's curse had worked, and when the warden opened his trunks, instead of coins he found ordinary stones The warden went mad and began throwing handfuls of the stones from the castle tower. These stones can be found around the castle even today. People call them "Poky's Ducats." This legend is recounted to this day in Bojnice.

Another interesting fact about Bojnice is that the park around the castle contains the oldest linden tree in Slovakia.

Palm Sunday ~ Kvetná Nedeľa



Palm Sunday is the sixth and final Sunday in Lent and it marks the beginning of Holy Week. For Catholics, it is a day to commemorate Jesus as he entered into Jerusalem. His path was decorated with palm branches, which is a symbol of victory. Because true palm or olive branches were not available to Slovaks, the custom is observed by blessing blossoming branches of other trees, including evergreens, boxwood, and pussy willow branches. These are symbolic of life, hope, and victory.

After returning from church on Palm Sunday, people put the blessed branches behind pictures or behind holy pictures, statues, and crucifixes in their home.

In the past, trees and plants were considered to be mediators between the souls of the dead and those of the living and, at the same time, places where souls dwelled. These early people believed that the branches of certain trees possessed supernatural powers, warding off evil spirits and protecting homes, farms, and pasture lands from harm.

Once Slovaks emigrated to America, palm weaving became a tradition for the new immigrants. Palm weaving is a folk art form that consists of taking palms and weaving, folding, and braiding them to create various designs. These patterns originally resembled pussy willow buds, since pussy willow branches were blessed in Slovakia. Shapes are only limited by the creativity of the weaver.
