LPSCU Newborn Benefit

The Newborn Benefit offered by the LPSCU is available to infants from 10 days old through six months who have at least one parent as a member in good standing with the Ladies Pennsylvania Slovak Catholic Union. St. John Vianney
St. Theresa of the Little Flower
St. André Bessette

\$300 ANNUALLY

The LPSCU is offering three separate Religious Awards for members entering religious life. They are:

* The St. John Vianney Award

This award is offered to any male member of the LPSCU aspiring to the priesthood. The member may apply for the \$300 award upon entrance into an approved program of priestly formation. The award may be renewed for each successive year until ordination, provided the member re-applies for said award each year.

The St. Theresa of the Little Flower Award This award is offered to any female member of the LPSCU aspiring to religious life. The member may apply for the \$300 award upon completion of her first year of Novitiate. The award may be renewed annually until the member is professed as a religious nun, provided she re-applies for said award each year.

* The St. André Bessette Award

This award is offered to a male member of the LPSCU aspiring to religious life as a brother in a religious congregation. He may apply for the \$300 award upon entrance into an approved program for religious brother formation. The award may be renewed annually for each successive year until completion of the program, provided the member re-applies for said award each year.

Following are the guidelines for applying for each of the Religious Awards. All applicants must:

- Be a member of the LPSCU for two (2) years with a minimum \$2,000 permanent reserve life insurance certificate (excludes term insurance).
- Provide a wallet-size color photo with the application.
- Re-apply each year while attending/completing studies for Religious Life in order to receive the award each year of his/her religious training.

Applicants must meet all criteria outlined and provide data indicated to be eligible. Incomplete applications or those missing data requirements will not be considered. All materials become the property of the LPSCU and will not be returned.

Applications are available from the LPSCU Home Office or its website. **Applications for the 2021 awards must be postmarked by August 31, 2021.**

SS.C.M. Appeal Continues

Cara Zemelman, a thirdgrade student at Cardinal Montessori School in Woodbridge, Virginia, has been honored as one of the brightest students in the world by the Johns Hopkins Center for Talented Youth (CTY). She was honored for her exceptional performance on the SCAT, an exam taken as part of the CTY Talent Search.

More than 15,000 students in grades two through eight tested through CTY's Talent Search between July 1, 2019, and June 30, 2020, representing all 50 states plus Washington D.C., Puerto Rico, Guam, the U.S. Virgin Islands, and Armed

Forces installations in Europe and the Pacific, as well as more than 70 countries. The students who scored in the top 9% on their test were 2020 Grand Honors awardees.

CTY is a non-profit affiliated with Johns Hopkins University. CTY began with a seventh-grade boy from Baltimore who had exhausted all the options for math courses he could take at school. Julian Stanley, a psychology professor at Johns Hopkins, worked with this boy to arrange access to challenging math courses so the boy could continue to develop his academic talents. In 1997, Dr. Stanley and Johns Hopkins founded CTY in response to the national need to recognize and develop the world's brightest young minds. Alumni of CTY include the co-founder of Google, the CEO of Facebook, and leaders in the sciences, arts, and government.

Normally, CTY holds a banquet in Baltimore, Maryland, for Grand Honors Awardees and their families, where medals are given to the students. This year, due to the COVID-19 pandemic, the award banquet was canceled, and awardees received their medals in the mail.

Cara resides in Woodbridge and is a member of LPSCU Branch 64, Pittsburgh, Pennsylvania. She is the daughter of Branch 64 member Theresa and her husband Cal, and big sister to Branch 64 members Danny and Diana.

POST GRADUATE AWARD

The LPSCU is offering two different Post Graduate Award benefits to our members who are awarded a Master's or Doctorate degree during the period running from July 1, 2020, to August 30, 2021. These awards are:

One Slovak Family: Expanding Slovak Citizenship

Slovak and Canadian Americans trace our roots to our ancestors' homeland of Slovakia and some of us prize our Slovak background. We prize our traditions and culture, love our unique Slovak foods, and wish to retain our ties with Slovakia. We feel Slo-



vak as part of our being. But when we travel to Slovakia, or do business there, we are officially considered to be "foreigners."

Global Slovakia wants to change that status. It has launched a movement called "One Slovak Family" for those who wish to recover their rights of citizenship, and/or facilitate the process of obtaining dual citizenship based on Slovak ancestry. But the broader aim is to reconnect with our Slovak roots and tap the talent which has left their family's original homeland.

Since the late 19th century, one-third of Slovaks have emigrated abroad, and that trend has continued since the Velvet Revolution of 1989. Emigration from Slovakia has ranked among the highest of any peoples worldwide. Many "hyphenated" Slovaks are scattered throughout the world – in the USA, Canada, Australia, the United Kingdom, Ireland, and many other countries around the globe. (Two million in just the USA have Slovak roots!)

Some of Slovakia's best and most talented people have settled abroad and continue to do so because of higher wages abroad and the perception of less opportunity in Slovakia. Over the course of history, many factors have contributed to the straining of ties with our original homeland: poverty, wars, onerous military drafts, Magyarization, Czechization, anti-immigration laws, totalitarian governments, bureaucratic inefficiencies, and time itself.

Most other countries (for instance, the Czech Repub-

lic, Poland, Ireland, and Italy) make it relatively easy for the descendants of emigrants to return to their family's homeland, and to obtain citizenship. Unfortunately, Slovakia does not rank among them and it "makes it needlessly hard for her sons and daughters to come home."

Slovakia needs to grow as a country and now faces a declining birth rate; the Slovak population could decline by as much as 30% given current trends. Thus, Slovakia must gain more citizens in order to even maintain its population at today's count. By extending Slovak citizenship to Slovak descendants, it would help unite our nation. When we grow in population size, we also grow in influence and gain more political and economic sway around the world.

In summary, "One Slovak Family" aims to reconnect Slovaks abroad with their homeland and reunite the Slovak family. As a starting point, it is lobbying so that the Slovak government will rewrite legislation on the conditions for becoming a Slovak citizen. It also aims to harness the full power and influence of the larger Slovak community in the world and facilitate its connections with the homeland. Success in this endeavor might achieve the following goals:

- Slovakia will gain representatives around the world.
- Emigrants will champion the interests of their homeland abroad.
- They will publicize and raise awareness of the country's opportunities in powerful places, circles, and through networks.
- They will make it easier for Slovak delegations, leaderships, and businesses to engage and bridge build with native communities abroad.


Chill overnight and slice into ¼" pinwheels. Enjoy!



My Favorite Irishman

It was on April 17, 2016, that I went to the NIU Convention Center in DeKalb, Illinois, to see Theresa Caputo, aka "The Long Island Medium." It was an enjoyable evening but when I got home, while changing to my nightgown, I noticed in the mirror a huge red rash on my back. Of course, I was frightened, but I did not want to go to the emergency room since I was very tired. I reminded myself that if I died in my sleep that night, it was okay because I had gone to confession. I planned to seek medical attention in the morning.

The next day, my doctor looked at the rash said, "You have shingles." I don't recall whether he ordered a prescription for me and I probably wouldn't have taken it anyway since I am a horrible pill taker, so I suffered through that day and the next. Then I remembered a story about a young woman in Peoria, Illinois, who, in September of 2010, had just delivered a stillborn



baby in the hospital. For two hours, she held the baby and in a loud voice called for the intercession of Archbishop Fulton J. Sheen. As the result of her plea, the baby miraculously lived. Recalling this story, I too prayed to Fulton J. Sheen and in about six to eight hours, the pain was gone and the oozing from the rash had stopped.

Do you remember Fulton J. Sheen? I grew up watching his inspirational evening TV show, *Life is Worth Living*. He always

used a blackboard in his program and when he would step away and later return to the blackboard, which by then had been cleaned, he would always praise "his angel" for doing a good job. He would walk up to the camera and look at it with piercing green eyes that seemed to look right through you. (Or perhaps his eyes were blue, but TV at the time was still black and white.)

Fulton Sheen was born in El Paso, Illinois, on May 8, 1895. He was baptized Peter John Sheen, but took his mother's maiden name of Fulton, perhaps as a way to distinguish himself from the many named Peter John. He rose through the ranks of the church until he finally was made Archbishop around 1969. He died on December 9, 1977, in the presence of the Holy Sacrament. Occasionally EWTN will rerun one of his television programs.

If you are interested in learning more about Archbishop Sheen, I found that *Wikipedia* has a good presentation of his life story.

LPSCU 20 PAYMENT LIFE INSURANCE PLAN

The 20 Payment Life Insurance Plan offered by the LPSCU is an economical and beneficial plan for anyone age 0 to 70. The ages and limits of insurance coverage for Non-Medical Rates are: 0-40, \$30,000; 41-60, \$20,000; 61-70, \$5,000. The LPSCU reserves the right to require a medical examination on any applicant.

Premiums are low and can be paid monthly, quarterly, semi-annually, or annually. The specific feature of this plan is that premiums are paid for a period of twenty years and then the certificate is paid in full. Coverage remains in full force and effect for the entire life of the insured without any additional premium payments required. Paul Bunyan Day ~ June 28

Paul Bunyan Day is a giant of a day. Paul Bunyan was a gigantic lumberjack in American folklore who has long been the hero of the American logging camps. Rumored to be 63 axe handles high, and able to eat 50 pancakes in a minute, the lumberjack bumbled his way across the United States, wreaking havoc and creating some of our most beautiful landmarks. His "tall tales," or greatly exaggerated exploits, have been celebrated in poems, stories, song, and film. In the tales, Paul Bunyan was almost always accompanied by his companion, Babe the Blue Ox.

Paul Bunyan is "credited" with many deeds. Among his more legendary feats:
